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Presenter Bios

Nicolas Anthony is Senior Principal Deputy Legislative Counsel with the Legal Division of the Legislative Counsel Bureau of Nevada. He serves as legal counsel to the Assembly and Senate Committees on Judiciary and is responsible for drafting and reviewing numerous legislative documents, including legislation relating to criminal justice, civil practice, business associations, and gaming.

Douglas A. Berman is the Robert J. Watkins/Procter & Gamble Professor of Law at The Ohio State University Moritz College of Law. Professor Berman is the sole creator and author of the widely-read and widely-cited blog, Sentencing Law and Policy. An editor of the Federal Sentencing Reporter, he is also managing editor of the Ohio State Journal of Criminal Law, and is directs the new Drug Enforcement & Policy Center at the Moritz College of Law.

Steven L. Chanenson is a Professor of Law at Villanova University Charles Widger School of Law, and the Faculty Director of The David F. and Constance B. Girard-diCarlo Center for Ethics, Integrity and Compliance. A former Chair of the Pennsylvania Commission on Sentencing, he is an editor of the Federal Sentencing Reporter and writes in the area of sentencing and criminal procedure.

Jack Chin, the Edward L. Barrett Jr. Chair and Martin Luther King Jr. Professor of Law at UC Davis School of Law, was reporter for the ABA Standards on Collateral Sanctions and for the Uniform Collateral Consequences of Conviction Act. His articles on collateral consequences have been cited in several U.S. Supreme Court opinions.

Alessandro Corda is Lecturer at Queen's University, Belfast School of Law in the United Kingdom and Fellow at the Robina Institute of Criminal Law at the University of Minnesota Law School. His research focuses on formal and informal restrictions and disabilities arising from criminal convictions in the United States and Europe.

Nora Demleitner is the Roy L. Steinheimer Jr. Professor of Law at Washington and Lee University School of Law and a senior fellow at Buffalo University's Baldy Center. An editor of the Federal Sentencing Reporter, her research focuses on sentencing and collateral sanctions. She often compares the laws and policies in the United States with those of European countries.

Ethan P. Fallon is a law clerk on the Supreme Court of California. He previously clerked for Judge John Gleeson (E.D.N.Y.) and Judge Denny Chin (2nd Circuit) and worked as an associate at Kellogg Huber in Washington, D.C.

Honorable Paul L. Friedman, United States District Judge for the District of Columbia, was formerly a partner at White & Case LLP, Assistant to the Solicitor General of the United States, Assistant United States Attorney for the District of Columbia, and Associate Independent Counsel for the Iran-Contra Investigation. A former President of the District of Columbia Bar, he is a Fellow of the American College of Trial Lawyers and Secretary to the American Law Institute and a member of its Council. He was an Advisor to the ALI Model Penal Code: Sentencing Project.

Andrew (Andy) Fogle is Supervisor of the Corrections Division of the Marion County Indiana (Indianapolis) Prosecutor's office. His responsibilities include oversight of the Prosecutor's Problem-Solving Division and the Post-Conviction Relief Division, and he is responsible for responding to all expungement petitions filed in Marion County. He teaches the Trial Practice course at the Indiana University McKinney School of Law.

John Gleeson is a partner at Debevoise & Plimpton in New York. Before joining Debevoise in March of 2016, he was a federal district judge in the Eastern District of New York for 22 years and a federal prosecutor in that same district for 10 years. During his time on the bench, Judge Gleeson wrote a number of influential opinions on sentencing and collateral consequences.

Eliza Hersh is an attorney in Oakland, California. From 2006 to 2016 she managed the Clean Slate Reentry Legal Services Practice at the East Bay Community Law Center, a teaching clinic of Berkeley Law School. She is currently a Soros Justice Fellow working on sex offense law and policy reform at Berkeley Law School's Center for the Study of Law and Society.

Jordan M. Hyatt is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Criminology and Justice Studies at Drexel University. His applied research focuses on the development and evaluation of effective correctional and reentry interventions.

Cecelia Klingele is Associate Professor of Law at the University of Wisconsin Law School, and since 2012 has served as Associate Reporter for the Model Penal Code: Sentencing revision. Her research focuses on criminal justice system administration, with an emphasis on community supervision.

Margaret Colgate Love practices law in Washington, D.C., specializing in clemency and restoration of rights. She directs the Collateral Consequences Resource Center, and is an Adviser to the Model Penal Code: Sentencing revision. She is co-author of a treatise on collateral consequences, and her research focuses on expungement and other relief mechanisms.

Joy Radice is an Associate Professor at the University of Tennessee College of Law where she teaches, inter alia, Criminal Law and a new Expungement Clinic. Her scholarship focuses on the intersection of criminal law and the administrative state and access to justice issues, specifically the enduring impact that criminal convictions and juvenile adjudications have through their post-conviction civil penalties.

John Rubin is Albert Coates Professor of Public Law and Government at the University of North Carolina School of Government, where he specializes in criminal law and procedure and directs a statewide education program for indigent defense counsel. He created and maintains an on-line searchable inventory of state collateral consequences, as well as a guide to relief procedures in North Carolina.

Honorable Tick Segerblom, a fourth generation Nevada legislator, is Senate Judiciary Committee Chair in the Nevada legislature and previously worked in the Carter White House and as Nevada Democratic Party State Chair. Senator Segerblom represents employees and unions and has been recognized as one of Nevada's top employment lawyers since 1993.
